Grand Opening of Tay River Gallery

New Venue for Local Ontario Artists

Tay River Gallery opened its doors on Saturday June 22, 2002 at 28 Wilson St. West in Perth Ontario. The small heritage stone building is located only a few blocks from Stewart Park and the Tay River. A long-time dream of the owner, Tay River Gallery showcases local culture by featuring the works of local Ontario artists, writers, small presses, craftspeople and musicians.

The months of May and June were spent in diligent and grueling work renovating inside and out at 28 Wilson St. Many thanks to Gray Sutcliffe, and crew for sticking with it while rain played havoc with painting schedules and toxic fumes from heat guns and ancient paint assaulted the senses. Persistence paid off; the exterior of the building looks lovely!

Visual Arts Group

Artists featured for the summer months include John Topelko, Renate Wesley, Tricia Savoie, John Alexander Day, Arlene McGee, Donna Naprstek and Sophia Jacoba van der Velde

John Topelko's oil paintings, at times reminiscent of Group of Seven works, feature wilderness landscapes of Ontario and Quebec with strong vibrant colours and simple lines. Particularly spectacular are the rainbow of colours John uses creating his skies and lakes.

Renate Wesley's country scenes depicting houses and farmyards are colourful, vibrant and romantic. Nadi, as she is more commonly known, also paints fascinating florals that frequently have a mystical quality to them as the painted flowers take on a life of their own.

John Alexander Day paints his landscapes on site to capture the subtle qualities of light. He has painted striking wilderness scenes from across Canada. His vibrant urban scenes with people engaged in activities are set in the Ottawa area.

Trisha Savoie demonstrates her passion for colour in her idyllic garden scenes, with prominently featured porches and garden gates. Her romantic, impressionist style is also evident in her lovely coastal scenes.

Arlene McGee's watercolours are a stunning reflection of the artist's spiritual connection with her natural environment. Her bold use of colour creates memorable scenes depicting Lanark terrain.

Donna Naprstek's watercolours depict country scenes with her favourite subject, horses. This artist clearly has fun creating her light and playful pastoral scenes.

Sophia Jacoba van der Velde loves to paint finely detailed watercolours of the minutiae of plant life in her surroundings. Featured in the Gallery is her watercolour, Grape Vines.

Photographic works of Carolyn Molson and Barbara Lapointe are featured for the summer season. Barbara's display includes two breath-taking scenes from Giverny, France taken at the Monet gardens. Carolyn provides a taste of the Maritimes, daisies and a stunning sunset scene in her photographic display.

Fine Crafts Group

Victoria Jenkins creates pottery and clay sculptures. Some of her functional pottery has a nostalgic quality to it - pieces that look like something one would find in grandmother's kitchen. Her clay sculptures are unique and stylized whimsical pieces. Oriental brush painting on plates and polar bear and elephant sculptures are among her favourite motifs.

Ray Rovas, woodturner, creates beautiful imaginative bowls in all shapes and sizes using black cherry, maple, and cedar. Ray likes to emphasize the unique quality of the wood piece, accentuating flaws as a focal point of attention. Spalting techniques, metal, leather weaving and other elements are included to add character to his pieces.

Karen Goetzinger, an award winning quilter creates finely detailed oriental wall hangings with liberal use of rich colours and pattern, and hand-embroidered elements.

Graham Turnbull, stained glass artist, with over 12 years experience, displays a few of his intricately designed larger works in the gallery. Graham also offers classes in stained glass.

Donna Sproule's labour of love is creating primitive hooked rugs for hanging on the wall or placing on the floor and created in the original Acadian (East Coast) fashion. The warm texture and colours with homey scenes depicted in Donna's rugs provide a restful backdrop to any setting.

Jannie van Eijk artist and designer, exhibits three of her fascinating figurative sculptures: Life in the Fast Lane, Expert at Works and The Young Boy. An artist talented working in many mediums, Jannie also creates hand painted silk scarves with oriental motifs and painted doll brooches.

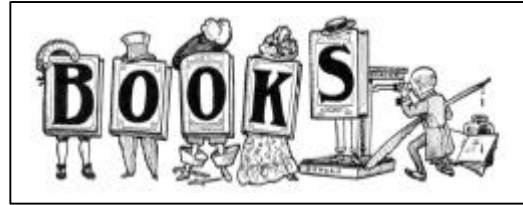
Ann Stoodley, clothing designer, creates brightly coloured children's clothing designed for play and unique ladies' vests designed for special seasonal events and everyday wear.

Jim Brown is a talented scroll artist who creates nature scene collector plates in pine and scrolled wall shelves with nature scenes with birch and butternut wood Unique birdhouses in a myriad of designs – churches, haciendas, pagodas, caboose, lighthouse and hanger to list a few - are created with the imaginative woodworking skill of Laurence Brown.

Bert Lacroix, cabinetmaker of nostalgic look armoires and china cabinet shows two of his pine pieces. Ev Bolton builds wishing wells in a variety of sizes to suit any garden setting.

Horse Scene Blankets in a wide range of sizes and stuffed horses are created by

Donna Naprstek and large patchwork blankets by Sophia. Jewellery featured includes switchable earrings by Conversations In Jewellery artist, Cecile Reichert.
